#3. Find the entrance to Mud Cave. When you exit the Scenic Loop, turn right and park at the Glassberg Shelter. Along the walkway, just past the "Park Service Vehicles Only" sign, you'll see a dirt/rock path going down the hill on your left. Follow it for 450 feet to the cave. The cave is just one small room, but they call it Mud Cave for a reason! Don't go in without Mom or Dad, and old clothes and flashlights are a must!! Use your Junior Park Ranger observation skills and look around the area... why do you think this cave is so muddy?
